## Keeping Physician Trainees in NJ

1	Whereas: the United Health Foundation's (UHF) America's Health Rankings 2023 Annual
2	Report indicates that New Jersey ranks 49th in the nation for access to primary care providers,
3	with a rate of 181 providers per 100,000 people, significantly below the national rate of 232, and
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5	Whereas: the report highlights the critical challenge of a low number of primary care physicians
6	in the Garden State, and

8	Whereas: the article "Primary care saves lives. Here's why it's failing Americans" by Frances
9	Stead Sellers, published on October 17, 2023, underscores the vital role of primary care in
10	improving health outcomes and saving lives, and

12	Whereas: the lack of adequate primary care access can lead to delayed diagnoses, uncoordinated
13	care, and increased healthcare costs, and
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15	Whereas: there is a need to incentivize family medicine physician trainees to stay, practice, and
16	contribute to the healthcare landscape in New Jersey, and
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18	Whereas: increasing residency training positions in family medicine in New Jersey can help
19	address this critical shortage and improve access to primary care, and
