

NJAFP 2024 Resolution #7 Proposed by Kelly Ussery-Kronhaus, MD, FAAFP

Resolution Urging Prohibition of Prior Authorization for Generic Medications to Reduce Administrative Burden

1	Whereas: the New Jersey Academy of Family Physicians (NJAFP) is committed to advancing
2	the well-being of patients and promoting policies that enhance the efficiency of healthcare
3	delivery; and

Whereas: generic medications play a pivotal role in providing cost-effective and clinically equivalent alternatives to brand-name drugs, contributing to improved affordability and accessibility for patients; and

Whereas: the NJAFP recognizes that the imposition of prior authorization requirements for generic medications places an undue administrative burden on healthcare providers, diverting valuable time and resources away from direct patient care; and

Whereas: the administrative complexities associated with obtaining prior authorization for generic medications contribute to increased workload, creating challenges for healthcare professionals to efficiently navigate the prescription process; and

Whereas: the unnecessary administrative hurdles in the form of prior authorization requirements for generic medications can result in delays in patient care, potentially compromising patient outcomes; and

Whereas: the NJAFP is dedicated to promoting policies that streamline administrative processes, allowing healthcare professionals to focus more on patient care and less on bureaucratic tasks; now therefore be it

RESOLVED: the New Jersey Academy of Family Physicians (NJAFP) request through resolution to the AAFP COD and/or board requests that the American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP) advocate for the prohibition of prior authorization requirements specifically for generic medications, recognizing their established safety, efficacy, and cost-effectiveness, and be it further

RESOLVED: the New Jersey Academy of Family Physicians (NJAFP) request through resolution to the AAFP COD and/or board requests that the American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP) collaborate with policymakers, insurers, and relevant stakeholders to develop and promote policies that eliminate unnecessary administrative barriers, especially those related to prior authorization for generic medications., and be it further

RESOLVED: the New Jersey Academy of Family Physicians (NJAFP) request through resolution to the AAFP COD and/or board requests that the American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP) educate healthcare professionals, insurers, and the public about the clinical equivalence of generic medications and the importance of reducing administrative burdens to enhance overall healthcare efficiency, and be it further

 RESOLVED: the New Jersey Academy of Family Physicians (NJAFP) request through resolution to the AAFP COD and/or board requests that the American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP) support legislative and regulatory initiatives at both state and national levels aimed at prohibiting prior authorization requirements for generic medications, with the goal of minimizing administrative burden.
