Dear Healthcare Provider,

The New Jersey Department of Health is partnering with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to help protect mothers and babies from the consequences of public health emergencies.

As you know, there is a global pandemic of respiratory illness called Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) caused by a novel coronavirus (SARS-CoV-2). At present, we do not have information from published scientific reports regarding whether pregnant women are more susceptible to infection or more severe disease from SARS-CoV-2 infection compared with the general public. We also have very limited information on adverse pregnancy and infant outcomes among pregnant women with COVID-19.

The New Jersey Department of Health (DOH), in collaboration with CDC will monitor pregnant women who test positive for SARS-CoV-2 through the end of their pregnancy, including birth outcomes of their infant(s). By collecting existing laboratory and clinical information on these mothers and infants, we will be able to characterize the spectrum of health effects associated with SARS-CoV-2 infection during pregnancy to inform clinical guidance, programs, and services.

DOH staff have already begun to work with hospital Health Information Management Departments and are currently abstracting data from medical records for cases where delivery has already occurred. We are asking for your assistance, since current DOH procedures for identifying infected pregnant women are likely to miss some cases. In particular, our current case ascertainment may miss women with COVID-19 in early pregnancy who have an uncomplicated spontaneous or induced abortion before 20 weeks gestation. Direct reporting of known cases to DOH by the obstetric community will ensure that all outcomes, including early pregnancy losses, can be assessed during this effort.
